

# SALMOS VS. PASIÓN

Todos los añios, alrededor de estas fechas, cuando nos acercamos al final de la Cuaresma y está por llegar la Pascua, los católicos en todas partes leen los boletines, misales y publicaciones de su parroquia y se preguntan por qué al último domingo de Cuaresma se le llama "Domingo de la Pasión" y no "Domingo de Ramos". La designación formal fue cambiada en 1970; pero todavía muchas personas están más acostumbradas a llamarle "Domingo de Ramos".

Los ramos, por supuesto, son la conmemoración de la antigua costumbre de cubrir el camino de la persona a quien se honraba cuando ella pasaba por ese camino. En muchas regiones del Cercano Oriente, este era uno de los más grandes honores, a menudo reservado para la realeza. En los cuatro Evangelios vemos que Jesús recibió ese honor al hacer su entrada triunfal en Jerusalén, días antes de su ejecución. En Mateo, Marcos y Lucas, encontramos que las multitudes tiraron sus mantos en el camino y cortaban ramas. Solo en el Evangelio de Juan se menciona específicamente a los ramos de palma.

#### En las Iglesias católicas, es costumbre entregar a los fieles las palmas que fueron

bendecidas al inicio de la liturgia y llevadas en procesión al inicio de la Misa. Entre las costumbres privadas de las personas está entretejer estas palmas en forma de cruz y de otras formas durante la liturgia. Yo quisiera creer que las personas no están hacienda esto durante mi homilía pero mi experiencia me dice que sí lo hacen.

Al final, la celebración de este día no se trata de las palmas, al igual que la Navidad no se trata de árboles decorados con luces de colores. Como lo muestran claramente las oraciones y las Escrituras, la liturgia es realmente acerca de la pasión de Cristo-su disposición a sufrir por nuestra salvación y por el perdón de nuestros pecados. Al final de la lectura de la narración de la pasión, las palmas parecen algo triste e irónico, ya que las multitudes que recibieron a Jesús en Jerusalén se fueron transformando en esas multitudes que, durante su juicio, gritaban "¡Crucifíquenlo!". La inconstancia y la fragilidad humana contrastan con la integridad y el coraje de Jesús.

Así que tiene sentido que le llamemos "Domingo de la Pasión". Pero las viejas costumbres y la antigua terminología no cambian fácilmente.

#### St. Vincent de Paul: Vital Help for the Suffering and Those in Need

Saint Vincent de Paul is a global charity network that now operates in 142 countries. In the United States, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul comes to the aid of 12 million people annually. Members of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, known as Vincentians comefrom all walks of life to help the poor meet their needs both spiritually and materially.

Our Parish Conference began in 1876 under the auspices of Monsignor McMahon and supplied shoes for children and offered food to the unemployed.

Currently, the St. Mary – St. Catherine of Siena Conference, a team of about 10 parishioners, handle a variety of issues every week. Some people need help with the rent, while others are in need of a kitchen table or beds for their kids. A team will make home visits to determine their living situation and make appropriate recommendations corresponding to their needs. Often we connect thosein need to our Parish emergency food pantry, Harvest on Vine. Clients are also informed about Masses and programs at St. MarySt. Catherine of Siena Parish.

If you would like to make a donation to help this cause, there are boxes at the rear of the Church. Please remember, especially during this Lenten season, to help those less fortunate. "The poor have much to teach you. You have much to learn from them."  $\sim$  St. Vincent de Paul





#### WHAT IS "THE SOMETHING " WE CAN WE DO?

It helps now and then to step back and take a long view. The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is beyond our vision. 

# FAITH FACTS

The Gospel Reading.

Crucifixion was the method used by the Romans to execute people. Often, the vertical part of the cross stayed in the



ground. The prisoner carried the cross-beam to the place of execution. He might or might not be tied to the beam. At the place of execution he was nailed to cross-beam and the beam was slotted onto the upright. Then the victim's feet were nailed to the upright. In Jesus' case, a notice was fixed to the cross.

Crucifixion was a horrible and agonizing way in which to die.
