TERCER DOMINGO DE CUARESMA

Acompañado de sus discípulos, Jesús sube por primera vez a Jerusalén para celebrar las fiestas de Pascua. Al asomarse al recinto que rodea el Templo, se encuentra con un espectáculo inesperado. Vendedores de bueyes, ovejas y palomas ofreciendo a los peregrinos los animales que necesitan para sacrificarlos en honor a Dios. Cambistas instalados en sus mesas traficando con el cambio de monedas paganas por la única moneda oficial aceptada por los sacerdotes.

Jesús se llena de indignación. El narrador describe su reacción de manera muy gráfica: con un látigo saca del recinto sagrado a los animales, vuelca las mesas de los cambistas echando por tierra sus monedas, grita: «No convirtáis en un mercado la casa de mi Padre».

Jesús se siente como un extraño en aquel lugar. Lo que ven sus ojos nada tiene que ver con el verdadero culto a su Padre. La religión del Templo se ha convertido en un negocio donde los sacerdotes buscan buenos ingresos, y donde los peregrinos tratan de "comprar" a Dios con sus ofrendas. Jesús recuerda seguramente unas palabras del profeta Oseas que repetirá más de una vez a lo largo de su vida: «Así dice Dios: Yo quiero amor y no sacrificios».


Aquel Templo no es la casa de un Dios Padre en la que todos se acogen mutuamente como hermanos y hermanas. Jesús no puede ver allí esa "familia de Dios" que quiere ir formando con sus seguidores. Aquello no es sino un mercado donde cada uno busca su regocio. No pensemos que Jesús está condenando una religión primitiva, poco evolucionada. Su crítica es más profunda. Dios no puede ser de protector y encubridor de una religión tejida de intereses y egoísmos. Dios es un Padre al que solo se puede dar culto trabajando por una comunidad humana más solidaria y fraterna.

Casi sin darnos cuenta, todos nos podemos convertir hoy en "vendedores y cambistas" que no saben vivir sino buscando solo su propio interés. Estamos convirtiendo el mundo en un gran mercado donde todo se compra y se vende, y corremos el riesgo de vivir incliso la relación con el Misterio de Dios de manera mercantil.

Hemos de hacer de nuestras comunidades cristianas un espacio donde todos nos podamos sentir en la «casa del Padre». Una casa acogedora y cálida donde a nadie se le cierran las puertas, donde a nadie se excluye ni discrimina. Una casa donde aprendemos aescuchar el sufrimiento de los hijos más desvalidos de Dios y no solo nuestro propio interés. Una casa donde podemos invocar a Dios como Padre porque nos sentimos sus hijos y buscamos vivir como hermanos.

March 3 ~ Third Sunday of Lent

In today's Gospel, Jesus may come across as harsh. Jesus knew well the wrongs and injustices that were prevalent in some temple practices. His action is meant to highlight those who made it difficult, if not impossible, for people to feel welcome in the house of God. Are our attitudes or ways of behaving as church or as parish seen as snobbish or impersonal or unwelcoming? In our efforts to be a welcoming and evangelizing parish, it is important that each of us examine our attitudes and work to change what might keep people from feeling at home with us. During these Lenten days let us make it our mission to make our parish a place where everyone has a place, and no one feels excluded.



The month of March is dedicated to St. Joseph. We don't know much about him except what is mentioned in the Gospels. Joseph was the husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster-father of Jesus. Holy Scripture proclaims him as a "just man," Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical *Quamquam Pluries (On the Devotion to St. Joseph)* in 1889 explains why we place so much trust in this saint:

"Thus in giving Joseph the Blessed Virgin as spouse, God appointed him to be not only her life's companion, the witness of her maidenhood, the protector of her honor, but also, by virtue of the conjugal tie, a participator in her sublime dignity. And Joseph shines among all mankind by the most august dignity, since by divine will, he was the guardian of the Son of God and reputed as His father among men. Hence it came about that the Word of God was humbly subject to Joseph, that He obeyed him, and that He rendered to him all those offices that children are bound to render to their parents."


