



Here's an update from Sunday's Youth Group (pictured here) and Confirmation Classes!

The class began with a great discussion on generosity and was co-lead by two students from the Confirmation 2 class. We talked about generosity and its particular significance during Lent, and learned about St. Mother Teresa, an incredible example of generosity. We also discussed where we are in the Liturgical Year, including Lent, Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and Easter. A special thank you to Thomas and Gwen for co-leading a fun and engaging class with Kerry and also for sharing their experiences about being Confirmation Candidates.

In addition, we completed an Easter Lenten service project that involved assembling more than 80 treat bags filled with pastel-colored M&Ms, telling the Easter story. By turning the candies around, the "M" becomes a "W," a "3" and an "E". Each bag was filled with 40 colored M&Ms (for the 40 days of Lent) and included an Easter poem folded inside. These creative treat bags will be handed out by available students at the 11 am Easter Sunday mass. Thank you to Father John for joining in the fun of assembling the treat bags! Our next class and final Youth Group is Sunday, April 7th at 7pm, following the 6 pm mass.



Confirmation 1 students started Part 1 of the discussion on the Holy Spirit, including who is the Holy Spirit and what does he do? We reviewed the symbols of the Holy Spirit and shared experiences of the Holy Spirit in our lives. We also talked about generosity and its particular significance during Lent, and learned more about St. Mother Teresa, an incredible example of generosity.

Thank you to Allison Buff for leading the discussion and to Fr. John for joining the class and sharing his personal perspectives on the Holy Spirit.

Another note of appreciation goes to the Confirmation 1 students who volunteered to help the 2nd graders as they prepare for First Holy Communion by assisting at the Reconciliation/Penance services on Wednesday, Feb. 29th at St. Francis de Sales and this coming Thursday, March 7th at St. Mary/St. Catherine's (5:30 pm - 7pm).

Confirmation 2 candidates continued their discussion of the topic of Prayer, including why we pray, how we pray, and ways to think about prayer as a conversation with God. They also started a conversation on the Holy Spirit and the role that the Holy Spirit plays in our lives.

En este cuarto domingo de Cuaresma, llamado «loetare», que sig-nifica «alégrate», porque la antífona de entrada de la liturgia eucarística nos invita a la alegría: «Alégrate, Jerusalén así es su invitación a la alegría-; saltad de gozo y alegraos los que habéis caído en la tristeza».

Estamos llamados a abrir los oídos a este anuncio, rechazando la tentación de considerarnos seguros de nos- otros mismos, de querer prescindir de Dios, reivindicando para nosotros la absoluta libertad de él y de su palabra. Cuando encontramos el coraje de reconocer lo que realmente somos i se necesita mucho coraje para esto!-, nos damos cuenta de que somos personas llamadas a arreglar las cuentas con nuestra fragilidad y nuestros límites. Y nosotros tenemos la ver-dadera y grande esperanza en Dios Padre, rico en misericordia, que nos ha dado a su Hijo para salvarnos, y esa es nuestra alegría.

March 10 ~ Fourth Sunday of Lent ~ Laetare Sunday

Oftentimes at sports events, people hold up a sign "John 3:16" to be shown on a jumbotron! It's likely that many people do not know what John 3:16 is, let alone what the text says! We're given that text in today's Gospel. This text is given to us to remind us of the extent of God's love, the length to which our God went to convince us of his love. All are included in God's vast inclusive love. God loves each one of us as if we were the only one in the world to be loved. As Lent continues take a few minutes to ponder God's all-inclusive love for you. How will you respond to that love?

LAETARE SUNDAY



Laetare Sunday is the fourth Sunday in the season of Lent, in the Western Christian liturgical calendar. Traditionally, this Sunday has been a day of celebration, within the period of Lent. This Sunday gets its name from the first few words (incipit) of the traditional Latin entrance (Introit) for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem") is Latin from the Book of Isaiah 66:10-11

On Laetare Sunday (as similarly with the Third Sunday of Advent's Gaudete Sunday) the Church expresses hope and joy in the midst of our Lenten fasts and penances. It is also called Rose Sunday and pink (rose) vestments are worn. This change in color indicates a glimpse of the joy that awaits us at Easter, just before we enter into the somber days of Passiontide.
