Collaborative Worship Committee

As we look up and look ahead, a major goal for our Collaborative will be to initiate and develop committees to help us grow together as parishes and as a collaborative. We begin, as in all things, with the worship and service of our loving God as a combined committee.

The Worship Committee gives direction to the liturgical life of the parish, as well as fostering and promoting the spiritual growth of all parishioners, enabling us all to understand what it means to be a baptized Catholic Christian. It also seeks to provide opportunities for personal and communal prayer in a variety of ways, coordinating the weekend Masses for the various seasons, liturgical ministries, Marian and Eucharistic devotions, prayer services outside of Mass, periodic retreats and the annual Parish Missions during Lent and Advent.

The Worship Committee comprises music directors and leaders, Eucharistic Ministers, Lectors, Greeters, Ushers, Faith Formation directors, Baptismal prep and Funeral coordinators, and others in both parishes.

It is responsible for the following:

Coordinating and collaborating the liturgical ministries of the parish, including music, lectors, Eucharistic ministers, ushers, greeters, servers, art & environment.

Fostering dialogue between liturgical ministers and committees in order to insure that liturgical and spiritual programs are reaching the needs of all parishioners.

Evaluating periodically the weekend liturgies, drawing upon the insights and feedback of parishioners.

Promoting communal prayer through the parish missions, days of recollection, and Advent and Lenten devotions.

Fostering an annual evaluation of parish programs of spirituality in order to discover what is working and what more might be needed in order to meet the diverse needs of the parishioners.

If you are interested in this valuable service to God's Holy Church, her people and our Mission as a collaborative, please see Fr. John. Don't be surprised if you are asked to serve. We'll have some relaxed discussions and preparation later on this summer, and we'll meet on a monthly basis from there. You don't need a theology degree, just a heart, mind and soul!



La vida cristiana se desarrolla totalmente en el signo y en presencia de la Trinidad. En la aurora de la vida, fuimos bautizados «en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo» y al final, junto a nuestra cabecera, se recitarán las palabras: «Marcha, oh alma Cristiana de este mundo, en el Nombre de Dios, el Padre omnipotente que te ha creado, en el nombre de Jesucristo que te ha redimido, y en el nombre del Espíritu Santo que te santifica».

Entre estos dos momentos extremos, se enmarcan otros llamados de «transición» que, para un cristiano, están marcados por la invocación de la Trinidad. En el nombre del

Padre, del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo, los esposos se unen en matrimonio y los sacerdotes son consagrados por el obispo. En el pasado, en nombre de la Trinidad, comenzaban los contratos, las sentencias y todo acto importante de la vida civil y religiosa.

No es verdad, por tanto, el que la Trinidad sea un misterio remoto, irrelevante para la vida de todos los días. Por el contrario, son las tres personas más «íntimas» en la vida: no están fuera de nosotros, como sucede con la mujer o el marido, sino que están dentro de nosotros. «Hacen morada en nosotros» (Juan 14, 23), nosotros somos su «templo».

Pero, ¿por qué creen los cristianos en la Trinidad? ¿No es ya bastante difícil creer que Dios existe como para añadir también que es «uno y trino»? ¡Los cristianos creen que Dios es uno y trino porque creen que Dios es amor! La revelación de Dios como amor, hecha por Jesús, ha «obligado» a admitir la Trinidad. No es una invención humana.

Si Dios es amor, tiene que amar a alguien. No existe un amor «al vacío», sin objeto. Pero, ¿a quién ama Dios para ser definido amor? ¿A los hombres? Pero los hombres existen tan sólo desde hace unos millones de años, nada más. ¿Al cosmos? ¿Al universo? El universo existe sólo desde hace algunos miles de millones de años. Antes, ¿a quién amaba Dios para poder definirse amor? No podemos decir que se amaba a sí mismo, porque esto no sería amor, sino egoísmo o narcisismo.

Esta es la respuesta de la revelación cristiana: Dios es amor porque desde la eternidad tiene «en su seno» un Hijo, el Verbo, al que ama con un amor infinito, es decir, con el Espíritu Santo. En todo amor siempre hay tres realidades o sujetos: uno que ama, uno que es amado, y el amor que les une. El Dios cristiano es uno y trino porque es comunión de amor. En el amor se reconcilian entre sí unidad y pluralidad; el amor crea la unidad en la diversidad: unidad de propósitos, de pensamiento, de voluntad; diversidad de sujetos, de características, y, en el ámbito humano, de sexo. En este sentido, la familia es la imagen menos imperfecta de la Trinidad. No es casualidad que al crear la primera pareja humana Dios dijera: «Hagamos al ser humano a nuestra imagen, como semejanza nuestra» (Génesis 26-27).

Según los ateos modernos, Dios no sería más que una proyección que el hombre se hace de sí mismo, como uno que confunde con una persona diversa su propia imagen reflejada en un arroyo. Esto puede ser verdad con respecto a cualquier otra idea de Dios, pero no con respecto al Dios cristiano. ¿Qué necesidad tendría el hombre de dividirse a sí mismo en tres personas: Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo, si verdaderamente Dios no es más que la proyección que el hombre hace de su propia imagen? La doctrina de la Trinidad es, por sí sola, el mejor antídoto al ateísmo moderno.

¿Te parece demasiado difícil todo esto? ¿No has comprendido mucho? Te diría que no te preocupes. Cuando uno está en la orilla de un lago o de un mar y se quiere saber lo que hay del otro lado, lo más importante no es agudizar la vista y tratar de otear el horizonte, sino subirse a la barca que lleva a esa orilla. Con la Trinidad, lo más importante, no es elucubrar sobre el misterio, sino permanecer en la fe de la Iglesia, que es la barca que lleva a la Trinidad.

I stand for freedom. I am confident; I am arrogant; I am proud. When I am flown with my fellow banners, my head is a little higher, my colors a little truer. I bow to no one. I am recognized all over the world. I am loved and I am feared. I have fought

in every battle of every war for more than 200 years: Gettysburg, Shilo, Appomattox, San Juan Hill, the trenches of France, the Argonne Forest, Anzio, Rome, the beaches of Normandy, Guam, Okinawa, Japan, Korea, Vietnam, in the Persian Gulf and a score of places long forgotten, by all but those who were there with me. I was there. I led my Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Marines. I followed them and watched over them. They loved me. I was on a small hill in Iwo Jima. But I shall overcome, for I am strong. I have slipped the bonds of earth and from my vantage point on the moon, I stand watch over the uncharted new frontiers of space. I have been silent witness to all of America's finest hours. But my finest hour comes when I am torn in strips to be used as bandages for my wounded comrades on the field of battle - when I fly at half mast to honor my Soldiers, my Airman, my Sailors, my Marines, and - when I lie in the trembling arms of a grieving mother, at the graveside of her fallen son or daughter. I am proud. My name is "Old Glory." Long may I wave, dear God, long may I wave."

You may donate to lighting the Sanctuary Candle in either the upstairs Church or in the St. Catherine of Siena Chapel in memory of a loved one. The red Sanctuary Lamp is always lit when the Real Presence is in the Tabernacle. There is a requested donation of \$15.00 which is used for the purchase of the candles. The Lamp will be lit for seven days (Sunday to Saturday) in memory of your loved one.

MASS FOR AN INTENTION AND MASS CARDS



It is a common and beautiful gesture for parishioners to ask to have Mass celebrated in memory of a deceased loved one and/or for some special intention. Praying for our loved ones who are deceased is a spiritual work of mercy. Customarily, an offering is made for a special intentioned Mass. In order to avoid any abuses about the celebration of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, Church law regarding the appropriate stipends for such requests is very specific and the

standard offering requested for an intentioned Mass is \$15.00. Mass Cards are available at the Parish Center and are also \$15.00 (These are for Masses said privately by a priest) The bulletin lists requests for intentioned Masses and who the Sanctuary Candle is lit for each week. Any requests to appear in the bulletin must be made no later than one week prior.
